Overview

When Adam and Eve were created, they had life in all its fullness. God met all their needs. They were perfectly accepted, secure and significant. In the "fall" they lost their relationship with God. The result for us is that we are born with a huge need for acceptance, security and significance. Jesus came to restore the very same life, acceptance, security and significance that Adam and Eve had originally.

Getting Started

Free Play (20 minutes)

Welcome (5 minutes)

This is a chance to welcome the children but also an opportunity to have fun with them.

Announcements And Ground Rules (5 minutes)

Just as games have rules so that you can play and have fun, clear discipline guidelines are needed so the children know what is or isn't acceptable in the context of this gathering. Only two simple rules are necessary:

- 1. Nobody leaves their seat. If they need to go to the bathroom then they must put their hand up and ask permission from a leader.
- 2. When you ask for quiet, everyone sits down, focuses on the front, and makes no sound.

Worship

Prayer (5 minutes)

In two sections:

- 1. **Giving Thanks:** Children who have prayed for something the week before (or several weeks before) and whose prayers have been answered should be asked to come and tell the others how God answered their prayer.
- 2. Bringing Needs: Some of the children will want to pray for certain things. Allow them to come and mention what they are praying for and ask God together to answer prayer.

Game Choose one (5 minutes)

Game 1 – Pass The Mint

PREPARATION A packet of mints with holes in them, e.g. Polo or LifeSavers, and straws.

PLAYERS Four to five per team.

SET-UP Each player has a straw. The first player has the straw through the mint.

OBJECT Each team has to pass their mint to each member of the team (via a straw) till the last team member has the mint. No hands can be used.

WINNING The first team to have the mint passed down every member.

Game 2 – Guess Who?

PREPARATION A list of questions (e.g. Do you have brown eyes? Are you wearing red? Do you have a fringe? Do you have freckles? etc.).

PLAYERS Everyone.

SET-UP Leader with a list of questions.

OBJECT All the children begin standing. After each question the children sit down if they match what is being said.

WINNING The last child standing is the winner.

Praise SuperStar (10 minutes)

The song that has been specially written for this lesson is "SuperStar", an anthem for *The Lightbringers* theme. We think your group is going to love it! See if they can come up with some actions for it. We suggest using a few praise songs for each session so you may want to introduce another song like "God Made Me Special" which will be used during the Steps to Freedom. Enjoy!

FUN FACT: Wayne Tester, who, together with his wife Esther, wrote and recorded the songs in *The Lightbringers*, won the competition to write the theme song for the Sydney Olympics where his song was performed in the opening ceremony. Ask the children to guess how many people heard that performance live.... It was an incredible 3.7 billion people in the TV audience around the world. That's half the population of the world listening to the same song at the same time!



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Bible Verse To Memorize (5 minutes)



• "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10:10)

Interview (5 minutes)

Invite one of the leaders or one of the children to come and tell the group what Jesus has done for them; how He's helped them in work/school; how He cares for them; how they first made their decision to become a Christian. If the person is very nervous, interview them. If they are more confident, allow them to speak freely – taking notice of the timing allowed for this section.

2. Explore The Bible (5 minutes)

Genesis 1-3



In order to find out the answer to the question, "Where did I come from?", we need to go back to the very start of the Bible, to the story of Adam and Eve in Genesis I-3.

When Adam and Eve were created, they had everything that they needed – all their needs were met by God. Adam had a purpose (to rule over the animals), everything was provided for, and they knew they belonged to God. Verses 26 and 27 (Genesis I) tell us that God created human beings in God's image and therefore Adam and Eve had a spiritual connection with God. But, when Adam and Eve were tricked by the devil into eating the fruit (what the Bible calls sin) they lost that connection with God. For the first time they began to have negative emotions, feeling fearful, depressed, and rejected (Genesis 3:10).

So, God sent Jesus to undo the work that the devil had done when he tricked Adam and Eve. God sent Jesus to bring us life and restore that connection with God (John 10:10).

How do you think Adam and Eve felt before they ate the fruit? What about afterwards? What had changed?

3. Illustration Choose one (5 minutes)

Illustration 1– Who am I?

Objects Needed: Water, lemon juice, cotton bud, white card and lamp, or alternatively buy invisible ink.

Create invisible ink by mixing a few drops of water with some lemon juice. Dip the cotton bud in the lemon juice and write on the white card, "The invisible things are as real as the stuff that's visible".

Who am I? My name is _____. I have _____hair.

But is this who I am? What if I dyed my hair or lost my arm? Would I still be me? What you see with your eyes are just the outer things of me.

Take this paper (hold up blank sheet of white card) – you can all see that this is plain white paper with no writing on it. But when I hold it to a light (shine a desk lamp onto the paper) you can see words (you could ask one of the children to read what it says). The invisible things are as real as the stuff that's visible.

We are made in God's image! That means that we are spiritual beings. In other words, we are made up of not just our bodies (the things you can see) but also the things that we can't see (our spirits).

Illustration 2 – God-Shaped Hole

Object Needed: Mint with hole e.g. Polo or LifeSavers.

Inside every one of us is a God-shaped hole in our hearts (hold up mint). It's a bit like this mint. This is how we were created – with a hole in the middle! Do you remember our Bible lesson about Adam and Eve? Sin separates us from God.

So how do we get our God-shaped hole filled?

A famous Mathematician (Pascal) once said, "There is a God shaped vacuum in the heart of every person, and it can never be filled by any created thing. It can only be filled by God".

Without Jesus we are empty but when we ask Jesus into our hearts He fills this hole with His Spirit, we are no longer separated from God, and we can have that connection with God. It's really easy – we just have to ask!

Illustration 3 – Safe, Special, And Accepted

Objects Needed: Cardboard Box (with no bottom) on a table with words SPECIAL, SAFE and ACCEPTED written on it. Current kids' magazines, certificate of achievement, football, pretend money.

In our life we all need to feel safe, special, and accepted (show box). We need to know that we are important. God has designed us this way. BUT, rather than looking to God, we may look to other things: good school results (*put certificate in the box*), being the best at sport (*put football in the box*); trying to be popular and following what our friends are doing (*put magazines in box*); having lots of money (*put money in box*) etc.


This might help us at first, but what happens when we are not picked for the team or we fail our test or our money runs out or our friends let us down? Kids, by filling our lives with anything other than God (*pick up box and let the contents fall*) will leave us feeling empty, just like this box. You can't feel safe, special, and accepted from this stuff. It is only God that can meet these needs. After all He created us this way and knows us better than we know ourselves!

Story Time (15 minutes)


The Story For Younger Children – *The Adventures Of Lilly Pepper*

Chapter 1 - Trouble At School

The video is 4.5 minutes. Take some time after the story to ask and listen to what the children think. Then go to the response and prayer time.



► Welcome to *The Adventures Of Lilly Pepper*! Are you ready? Let's go! Chapter I, Trouble At School.



► Lilly Pepper was seven years old. She lived with her mum and her baby brother, Jake, and a very scruffy dog called Mop.A strange name, but that's what Lilly wanted to call him when she was just two, so mum had agreed. That was the other thing about Lilly Pepper, she was very determined. In fact, her second name wasn't really Pepper at all. She'd been called that once by mum – because she liked eating raw peppers, green, yellow, red, she liked them all – and now she refused to be called anything else.


In the first weeks of any new school year when her real name was called on the school register, she would stand up, put her hands on her hips, and proclaim:

"Mr Edwards, my name is Lilly Pepper."


And after she did that a few times, Mr Edwards – like every teacher before him – gave in. The Story For Older Children - The Lightbringers

Chapter 1 - It Begins

She walked between the two pillars supporting the rusty gates, gates held by a loose rusty chain, but she easily squeezed through. These gates had been closed for many years. She stood on the edge of the road. The dazzling lights of a truck highlighted her bedraggled brown hair. Her clothes were wet through. Her denim jacket was completely drenched and no defence against this type of weather, but it was the only jacket she had. Her jeans clung tightly to her legs. Then the truck passed.

No one would notice the flowers on the grave. No one came to the graveyard unless it was for mischief. This graveyard had not been used for many years. Nobody remembered the people buried there now. Except one.

Lightning flashed but the girl had gone.






The rain continued to fall.

There were some things she was sure about. She was sure there was no parallel universe where everything was different and where the accident hadn't happened. She was sure that no new parents were going to walk through the door and take her away from the Home. She used to think that when she first arrived aged five, but four years had passed since then, and nobody wanted to adopt a nine-year-old girl who was considered "unusual". And finally she was sure that Thomas, who lived across in the boys' house, was always going to be crazy – in a good way, but definitely crazy. She was just sure.



But there were some things about which she was less sure. God. God was one of those areas in which she was less sure. She used to be absolutely sure. If God existed then He wouldn't have let the accident happen, and since the accident did happen, there couldn't possibly be a God. But now she was less sure. Particularly now that the new care-worker had arrived in the Home. She was used to new care-workers. They didn't stay for long, a few buckets of wallpaper paste above the door that would fall onto an unsuspecting man or woman as they came into the kitchen, itching powder gently poured down their back and a worm or two dropped into their cup of tea was usually enough to see them off. But, Mr Dundenter was different. They had placed the bucket of paste above the door, but no matter how many times he went in and out the bucket didn't move. But one walk through by Thomas and squelch/splat! He was covered. And Mr Dundenter didn't seem to notice the itching powder at all, even though Sophie had put a whole handful down his neck when she had pretended to bump into him. And when he had got to the end of his cup

of tea to see the worms wiggling at the bottom, he simply smiled, said, "Oh worms. My favourite," and lifted his cup one more time and swallowed the worms... Leaving Sophie and Thomas feeling slightly sick.



But that wasn't what made her unsure. It was what happened the day before. She had come home from school, sat in her room reading her library book and completely lost track of time. When she did look at the clock it was past dinner time and Cook was strict on meal times. Prayer (5 minutes)

Invite the children to stand and ask if anyone wants to ask Jesus to be their forever friend using the ABC prayer (this can be done in small groups or as one large group):


A – Admit your sins and ask for forgiveness;

- B Believe in Jesus;
- C Choose to follow Jesus for the rest of your life.

Dear God, I admit I have done wrong things and I need You. Please forgive me for my sins. I believe Jesus died and rose again for the things I've done wrong. I declare that Jesus Christ is now my Lord and Saviour. Thank You for saving me. I choose to follow You for the rest of my life. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Ask the children to speak to a leader if they prayed that prayer and have booklets to give out. There is also an example parent letter available in the downloads.

Pray that everyone will hear the truth God wants to show them today. Then encourage all the children to say the following prayer:




Thank You Lord for sending Jesus so that I can know You and have life!
